The Holy Gospel: Matthew 20:1-16

P: The Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew, the 20th chapter.

C: [sung] Glory to You, O Lord.

¹[Jesus said:] "The kingdom of heaven is like a master of a house who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. ²After agreeing with the laborers for a denarius a day, he sent them into his vineyard. ³And going out about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the marketplace, ⁴and to them he said, 'You go into the vineyard too, and whatever is right I will give you.' ⁵So they went. Going out again about the sixth hour and the ninth hour, he did the same. ⁶And about the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing. And he said to them, 'Why do you stand here idle all day?' ⁷They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You go into the vineyard too.' ⁸And when evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his foreman, 'Call the laborers and pay them their wages, beginning with the last, up to the first.' ⁹And when those hired about the eleventh hour came, each of them received a denarius. ¹⁰Now when those hired first came, they thought they would receive more, but each of them also received a denarius. ¹¹And on receiving it they grumbled at the master of the house, ¹²saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' ¹³But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong. Did you not agree with me for a denarius?' ¹⁴Take what belongs to you and go. I choose to give to this last worker as I give to you. ¹⁵Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or do you begrudge my generosity?' ¹⁶ So the last will be first, and the first last."

NEWS FROM KENYA: We are settled in a comfortable little house on the campus of the seminary where I am teaching. I am teaching four courses: New Testament Introduction and Survey, Wisdom Literature in the Bible, Psalms, and a course called, "Introduction to Christian Doctrine" (basically a course in catechetics). The area around the seminary is rural with cows, many goats, chickens, etc. The area is beautiful with lush vegetation and rolling hills and mountains. The temperature is moderate in the mornings and evenings (60's to 70's) but rises to the 90's during the day. Once a week we drive an hour or so from the seminary to the city of Kisumu to do our grocery shopping. We did have to spend some money to purchase some items that we needed in the house such as a toaster, tea kettle, etc. The students are very friendly and eager to learn. My class on the Psalms is intended for deaconess students so I have six ladies in the class (they love to talk with Katy). The day begins with chapel at 730 and classes begin at 800. The chapel services on Monday through Thursday are conducted in Swahili (we are slowly picking up several words here and there). Keep us in your prayers that God will bless our humble service here and bring us safely back to you.

Before we enter the Lenten battlefield to wage spiritual warfare with the devil, we remind ourselves that the victory is already won. Christ is risen and stands victorious! On this day, Sunday, He rose from the grave!

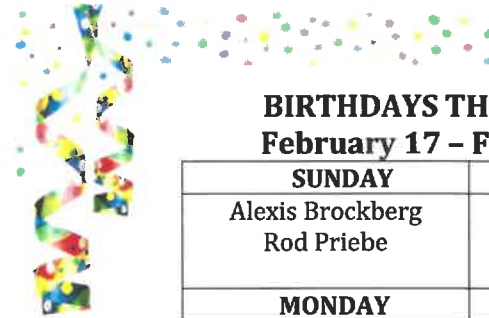
