A LETTER FROM PASTOR MATTHEW JOHNSON

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

As I push to wrap up my thesis proposal this spring and the entire dissertation next fall, I wanted to share with you some of the tools or perspectives that were important elements in my examination of Psalm 16, but taking up with you Psalm 23 in this edition of an Easter season newsletter article. While both Davidic psalms could be argued to have resurrection resonances, the earlier one was taken up by the apostles in the New Testament (Peter in Acts 2; Paul in Acts 13) and the latter one served as fundamental background for Jesus' discourse in John 10. While the former psalm on bodily incorruption appeared during a doctrinal controversy of the sixth century, the Good Shepherd psalm served more broadly for the liturgical life of the earliest church, particularly in its artistic portrayal of Christ, the Good Shepherd. A very similar depiction plays an important part in our congregation's liturgical life, thanks to the wonderful stained-glass window above the altar, amplified by the strong hymns bequeathed to us connected to the same comforting image.

The two main tools or perspectives I would like to highlight here could be thought of as "things to notice" or "ways to approach" a reading of any psalm. First of all, you will always want to pay attention to the speaker of a given psalm: what is the speaker's identity? how does the "voice" of the psalm adjust as we make our way through (and how does this impact meaning)? The presence of little titles at the head of some (but not all) psalms already shows us that the author and/or speaker is a factor to think about. Indeed, there are times when the author "speaks" for others (or overhears them and writes that out for us); sometimes the author speaks for Christ or as though from God's voice. In the next paragraphs we will see some of these aspects of this first tool in action with Psalm 23.

Take a look at Psalm 23 in your hymnal or bible. The images and words of the psalm will figure prominently for us on the Third Sunday of Easter (April 19), also known as Misericordias Domini ("the steadfast love of the Lord"...never ceases). An interesting element is evident in the way the author David uses language, as his words are given to him via the Holy Spirit's inspiration. The whole psalm very clearly has two halves: the first half finds David speaking *about* his shepherd (calling Him "He"), while the

second half reveals David speaking *to* his shepherd (calling Him “You”). This reality of language is underscored by the formal structure of the psalm: the midpoint of the psalm falls in the phrase “**for You are with me.**” There are 12 shepherdly, lordly blessings in total listed by David in the psalm on either side of this midpoint, six benefits in the first half (beginning with “I shall not want”), and six benefits in the second half (beginning with “...they comfort me”). Twelve is a wonderful number of the new Israel, particularly of the apostles charged by Christ to shepherd His blood-bought flock. In addition, there are 26 Hebrew words in each of the two halves, and if you were to assign a number value to each letter in the Hebrew alphabet the numeric “value” of the name “Yahweh” would be...26! This is, after all, the first word of the entire psalm: Yahweh—“the LORD”...is my shepherd.

I will freely admit that numbers and formal structure should not be allowed to “lead the way” when we read a psalm. In fact, many of these things don’t come through in English translation. But what does come through is found in the actual wording of this particular text; formal structure is stiff, while the words themselves in their combination and flow get us to the heart of the matter and of the meaning. We saw the words themselves doing this in the switch from “He” to “You.” In connection with “He” in the first half is “I,” while in connection with “You” in the second half is “me.” The verse in which the midpoint phrase is found participates in both halves to either side:

“Even though **I** walk through the valley of the shadow of death,
I will fear no evil,
for You are with me,
Your rod and **Your** staff,
they comfort **me.**”

The first time the word “You” appears in the psalm is at the axis or hinge of the whole thing, right in the middle of everything. Surely, these words are making a profound statement that gets picked up by Isaiah (He shall be called “Immanuel” in his seventh chapter) and Matthew (“He shall be called ‘Immanuel,’ which means ‘God with us’” in chapter one; “I am with you always” as the concluding promise of the crucified and risen Savior/Shepherd in the final, 28th chapter).

The second tool or perspective to bear in mind when reading the Psalms has to do with “intensification” or “heightening.” The little title for Psalm 23 says “of David.” We know from the historical books of the Old Testament that David was a literal shepherd of sheep (1 Samuel 16:11; 17:15; 17:34-37). This preparatory work as a shepherd of sheep enabled him to serve well as king of God’s people, Israel (in the ancient world the sovereign is often depicted as a shepherd—see Psalm 78:70-72). So already here, from shepherd to king (and from sheep to people), we see heightening. But in his Psalm, David intensifies this even more: “The LORD (Yahweh) is my shepherd.” David goes from being a shepherd and a king who cares for the people, to being a sheep who is himself cared for by God! This intensification is accelerated by the New Testament in John 10. Whereas in the Psalm David had spoken either *about* or *to* Yahweh, either *about* or *to* his Shepherd (that is, employing “He” in the first half and “You” in the second), in John 10, Jesus—the descendant and son of David—speaks for Himself when He says: “I am the Good Shepherd,” which is tantamount to saying “I am the LORD Yahweh.” The intensification from Psalm 23 to John 10 is mirrored in the heightening located in Matthew’s Gospel. The intensification is noticed in the comparison between chapter one (where Christ is being talked about as Immanuel) to the final

chapter (where Christ Himself speaks of Himself and promises with His own words that He, having all authority in heaven and on earth, will be with His people to the end of the age). Throughout this joyful Eastertide let us carefully listen to the words of Jesus Christ Himself, even as we rejoice to pray and sing the psalms as they speak to, about, and for our Lord!
